Last weeks trivia question:

Why do we take three steps back and forth before Shmoneh Esrei?

The correct answer was given by Shaiky Bergstein:

It is a custom to take three steps back (even though, this is not mentioned in early Poskim)

<u>The reasons</u>: **1**) It is done as in order to take three steps forward one must first take three steps backwards. [Kitzur Shelah ibid; See Elya Raba ibid] **2**) It is done to represent the three Milin that the Jewish people were distanced from Har Sinai, and then came close. [Chut Hashani ibid] **3**) It is done based on Kabalistic reasons. [Ben Ish Chaiy ibid] **4**) It shows that one is fearful of G-d, and hence distances himself before coming close. [Kaf Hachaim ibid; Piskeiy Teshuvos 95 footnote 14]
